

Sharon Lutheran Church Annual Meeting, June 15, 2022 Attendance = 50 members

Jeff Larson, Executive Director, called the meeting to order at 7:10 p.m.

Interim Pastor Karen Young Trenne opened with a prayer

Approval of Agenda and Minutes

Lillian Elsinga moved and Debbie Grow seconded to accept the agenda for this meeting and the minutes from the October 31st, 2021 Congregational Meeting as presented. Motion carried.

YTD Finance Report

Traci LaDouceur provided the year-to-date financial report (end of May). Our fiscal year ends June 30th. Operating revenue is \$816,754 and total expenses are \$843,047, for a deficit of \$26,292. If we end the fiscal year in deficit, will need to draw funds from our operating reserve fund, which has an optimal balance of \$90,000. We will need to do some fundraising to make up difference and pay back the operating reserve fund. Mortgage has been paid down an additional \$90,554 over the last year. On July 1, 2019, our mortgage balance was \$1.1 million and this July 1st it is \$379,000. Refinanced the mortgage in April and payment went down. We have used capital fund to pay for roof and elevator repairs. We had moved \$61,635 to the capital reserve fund last October.

Building Task Force Report

Sara Peters provided a report from the Building Task Force. The task force was formed at request of properties team to identify current building needs and opportunities for improvement in the future. Has identified a list of 50 capital items to

consider as well as a process for prioritizing capital needs. Thanks to task force members and everyone who went on tours and provided feedback.

Old Business

Roof Update – Jeff Larson reported that the flat part of the roof on the east side of the building was in dire need of repair. Last fall, we got a bid from Skinner Roofing for \$42,500, which was lowest bid. Accepted bid and they will start the work around end of July. Funds for this project will be paid out of the capital reserve fund which has a balance of \$88,410. The needed elevator repair will take another \$15,000 from the capital reserve fund. Traci was able to secure a \$5,000 grant to pay the remainder of the elevator repair.

Mortgage – Jeff Larson reported that the mortgage principal has been paid down by \$730,00 down in three years.

Celebration Hall Sound System – Matt Dahlen reported that a team of volunteers has installed all the parts that have come in, but they are still waiting on amps, speakers, and some radio parts for the microphones. System is working and the sound has been much better. Roxanne Gessler thanked those who have volunteered their time and talents to do this work.

Proposed Budget

Traci LaDouceur presented the proposed budget for FY22-23. We had to increase the properties budget as utility bills have been higher as well as for snow removal. The personnel committee suggested the budget for staff, which includes raises. The proposal is for a balanced budget with total revenue and expenses each budgeted at \$1,067,000. Pete Tunseth moved and Mary Adams seconded to accept the budget as presented. Motion carried.



Election

A roster of candidates for team chairs, at-large council members, and Treasurer seeking election to open positions was presented. The Treasurer candidate would serve the remainder of the term of Penny Zola, who has resigned from that role. Pete Tunseth moved and Steve Erlandson seconded that we cast a unanimous ballot as presented. Motion passed unanimously. Newly elected team chairs and council members are invited to the next Council meeting on June 23rd in South Hall at 6pm.

Executive Director Annual Report

Greetings and God's blessings to all of you.

I came across this message from Rick Warren. I have shared this with our council, and I would like to share it with you because I believe it speaks to all of us here at Sharon.

"The Benefits of belonging to a Church Family from Rick Warren"

When we get together, I want to encourage you in your faith, but I also want to be encouraged by yours. Romans 1: 12

The better connected you are to a church family, the more you will experience everything the church has to offer.

What does the church have to offer?

You learn your true identity. People often look for their identity in superficial things, such as their career, wealth, or favorite sports team. They may even try to find their identity in the brands of clothing they wear. But when you belong to Jesus, he gives you a whole new identity.

The Bible says, "Therefore if any be in Christ, they are a new creature: old things are passed away: behold, all things are become new. 2 Corinthians 5: 17

When you belong to Jesus, God adopts you into his family, the church. Unlike your physical family—in which people die, grow apart, move away, or divorce—your spiritual family is permanent and will last for all eternity in heaven. Ephesians 2:19 says, "you are citizens with everyone else who belongs to the family of God".

You are supported by others. Like the strong structure of a building, we hold each other up. Without the stable support system of a church, you may find yourself collapsing at some point in your life. You weren't meant to do it all on your own. You need physical, spiritual, emotional, and mental support.

Years ago, I began putting LEGO sets together with my grandkids. You know what I discovered? Each LEGO brick has no purpose on its own unless it's connected to others. Disconnected, they're just a pile of plastic. But when you connect them, you can build just about anything you can imagine.

This is Sharon Lutheran Church. We are stronger together and we can do just about anything, together. I would encourage you to hear and seek out where God is calling you. Interim Administrative Pastor Annual Report

By God's Grace, Created to Worship, Called to Teach, Committed to Serve

This is the time of the year to reflect on our mission as a congregation and set goals for the coming year. This past year has been full of worship, teaching, and service in Jesus' name. Our mask and distance restrictions have lifted. Worship attendance continues to climb, but has not reached pre-pandemic numbers. Our online worship continues to reach those in our community and around the country who are unable to worship with us in person. Our faith formation ministry has lifted its mask restrictions as well. The need for service in our congregation and community continues as never before. We are blessed with the generous contributions of time, talent, and resources.

Pastor Tawanda Murinda was called to a two-year term call this past January. He began his ministry with Sharon Lutheran in March on Ash Wednesday. The first day he was here a camera crew accompanied him. Later in the year a picture of Pastor Tawanda in the Sharon Lutheran Sanctuary was on the cover of the Living Lutheran magazine. This was because Pastor Tawanda was a recipient of an ELCA Fund for Leaders scholarship. His presence with us as one of our pastors would not be possible without the partnership of the ELCA. Our offering dollars going to the ELCA have come back to us as a blessing in Pastor Tawanda.

Barbara Jorgenson was hired as our new Administrative and Media Assistant, starting in June. She has become a wonderful asset to our staff. She and her family have also joined Sharon congregation as members.

Our Capital Campaign was finished on June 30th of this year. Beginning on July 1, 2019, Sharon Lutheran reduced its mortgage by over \$800,000 in just three years. The amount owed on the building is now less than \$400,000. This is a lasting legacy to the future of this congregation. As the digital age progresses, it is difficult to say how church buildings will be used in the future. Having this building paid for will allow the ministry to be able to adapt to the needs of the future church.

Sharon Lutheran continues to be led by a faithful congregation council and our executive director, Jeff Larson. The ministry teams (former boards) have been faithfully carrying out the ministries they are called to. All the teams are looking to expand their participants. If serving Jesus through one or more of these teams would give you joy, please do not hesitate to contact the team leaders. You can find their names in this report. Do not wait to be asked. Let your interest be known. The opportunities are endless.

I want to commend the Sharon Lutheran staff, Deacon Jamie Travers, Pastor Tawanda Murinda, Roxanne Gessler, Dave Berger, Steve DeKrey, Cheryl Nyhlen, Heather Peters, Missy Thompson, Barb Jorgenson, Dan Kuzel, Stephanie Leighton, Sue Kerr, and Jack Boyer, as well as other musicians, technicians, and coordinators for their faithful service to the congregation. They are a joy to work with and have continued to facilitate opportunities for this congregation to worship, teach, and serve in Jesus name.

The time has come for the congregation to move into the call process for a new administrative pastor. I have not been successful in recruiting a transition team who will work on the ministry site profile in preparation for the call committee to be formed. Please prayerfully consider serving on this important team if you are asked. Pray for Sharon Lutheran as we move into the next phase of this blessed ministry that Jesus has given to us.

Special events in September were planned and the team assisted.

In October the group planned a cereal fellowship to replace donuts on October 2nd, and trunk or treat for Halloween.

For December, helping with Advent events that are already planned.

The team also discussed Wednesday meals. A survey was in the process and it was decided to wait until the results were tabulated. The team did have Natalie Rohloff come to a meeting and speak about her past experiences with Wednesday meals.

Going forward into 2023 we discussed a January Birthday event.

This new team has kept active and energetic since its start in June of 2022.

Lay Ministry Team 2022 Annual Report

As per Sharon's constitution, the Lay Ministry Team is charged with the responsibility for the spiritual welfare of the pastor(s) and congregational members, individually and corporately, as well as the supervision of everything pertaining to congregational worship. The following is a brief summary/focus of the Lay Ministry team for fiscal year 2022.

The Lay Ministry Team assisted Sharon staff in brainstorming and planning for worship, particularly related to special events and celebrations such as outdoor worship, reformation and confirmation, All Saints Day, Thanksgiving Eve worship, Advent and Christmas services, Lent, Holy Week, and Easter services. Planning included Covid precautions and safety guidelines with continued focus on livestream worship and safe communion practices.

Approximately 64 worship volunteers are typically needed each week, for a total of more than 3,300 per year. Duties of worship assistants were modified as necessary to maintain sanitation as per Covid precautions. We continue to use SignUpGenius for volunteer registration with minimal success and have brainstormed other ways to engage more members to volunteer, including the use of Service Groups. We resumed the use of communion assistant cards at each service, and the Altar Guild has been handling communion preparation. We worked with Cheryl Nyhlen to

utilize youth as worship assistants and hope to continue that effort this year. We are anxious to work with the recently approved Volunteer Coordinator position to increase the level of volunteers for worship assistants.

The Lay Ministry Team recruited congregational members to serve on the Nominating Committee established to fill roles for the various teams. The Call Committee is working on plans to officially welcome Pastor Tawanda to Sharon. Staff and clergy continued to gracefully accept the challenges related to the on-going pandemic and Covid restrictions. Lay Ministry staffed the Welcome Center in August and will do so again in December.

Due to safety concerns and Covid protocol, Sharon's Nursery has not been available in FY 2021. The Lay Ministry Team is currently working on a survey tool to gather input from the congregation about the best use for that space moving forward.

Thank you to the current members of the Lay Ministry team including Jill Dahlen, Marlys Johnson, Kristi Larson and Kari Wiltse. Special thanks to Pastor Karen, Pastor Tawanda, Deacon Jamie, and Roxanne Gessler for joining us on the Lay Ministry team; we look forward to working together in the months to come!

We had a race track available and gave die cast cars and treats to all that participated. This includes a goal of collecting forms from at least 500 families or individuals estimating their giving over the next year.

SLC Youth Ministry Team Annual Report

YOUTH TRIPS

Middle School Mission Trip – Our middle schoolers traveled to Duluth, MN for a week in mid-June 2022 to learn, grow, and serve together. 5 students and 3 adult chaperones made the trip.

High School Trip to Red Willow – Our high schoolers unfortunately had to cancel their mission trip to Denver, CO, due to COVID concerns. Instead they traveled to Red Willow Bible Camp in mid-July 2022 for a week of fellowship, faith-based learning, and fun. 7 students and I chaperone made the trip.

Castaway – In September 2022, I3 middle and high school students and 8 chaperones made the trip to Castaway Club near Detroit Lakes, MN for a weekend of worship, recreational activities, and multiple trips to the campus coffee shop.

To prepare for these trips, the students fundraised by selling wreaths and youth stock and hosting dinner church. Total funds raised exceeded \$12,000!

Our middle schoolers have been excited to return to 5G youth group activities on Wednesday nights. Approximately 15-20 students and 3 adults meet weekly for fun, snacks, and fellowship together.

Our high schoolers continue to meet for Re:New youth group activities, which also happen on Wednesday nights. Approximately 12-14 students and 2 adults meet weekly for fellowship, laughter, and deep discussion.

345 Alive music group has returned for 3rd, 4th, and 5th graders at 3:45 on Sundays. Approximately 10 kids and 2 adults meet each week to share music and fellowship together.

The Middle School Lock-In last May involved 13 students and 5 adults who attempted to stay up all night, first visiting Northern Air and then settling in to play games and watch movies at the church. The High School Late Night event last spring involved 12 students and 3 adults who also had a great evening of games, snacks, and movies.

YOUTH TEAM

YMN Extravaganza - The ELCA Youth Ministry Network 2022 Extravaganza took place in February 2022, and 2 youth team members were part of a larger group that traveled to Minneapolis, MN for the weekend to learn and grow together. A 3rd youth team member was able to watch key sessions from home.

Our Youth Team currently has 7 members. We staffed the Welcome Center in May 2022 and we are back at it in the month of October.

WHAT'S UP NEXT:

Mission Trip - Next summer's mission trip location has been chosen, and our middle schoolers and high schoolers will be traveling together for our first-ever (at least in recent history) joint mission trip to Milwaukee, WI. 12-14 students and 4-5 adults are expected to go on this trip. The students were thrilled to learn that they will be departing at 4:30AM!

Fundraising - Wreath sales to support next summer's trip are running now through October 30. Stop by the table in the Narthex before and after worship in the month of October to purchase a wreath and show your support. Additional fundraisers are planned in the coming months. Youth Stock will take place in January, and the Spring Dinner will be back in 2023!

Faith Formation Ministries - Christian Education

In Matthew 19 and Mark 10, we find the story of Jesus and the little children. The disciples rebuke parents for bringing their children so close to Jesus. Jesus tells the disciples to stop. As this story is told in our Spark Story Bible, He said, "I want to bend down and look in their eyes and tell them about God's love too. Never stop anyone from coming to see me, especially children. Let the children come sit on my knee—children like these are part of God's big family too."

Are we not the hands and feet of Jesus? We, too, welcome the children and are ready to teach them about God's love. This takes a great number of volunteers and this past year, like many years before, we had a dedicated crew of volunteers who shared their faith, their time, and their love with the children of Sharon Lutheran Church.

We served over 150 children in four church school sessions, two on Sundays and two on Wednesdays. We attended worship on a rotating basis by grade level. It was an interesting year, as we were still trying to maneuver through the Covid-19 pandemic with social distancing and masks. A little beyond midyear we returned to "normal". It was fun to see all the faces! We continued our Ministry Milestones with all grades: Lambs—This Is My Lutheran Church; King's Kids—Baptism; Kindergarten—The Ten Commandments; First Grade—The Lord's Prayer; Second Grade—The Apostles' Creed; Third Grade—NRSV Student Bible and Family Bible Event; Fourth Grade—The Gospel of Mark; and Fifth Grade—Communion Conversations.

In June we were able to hold Vacation Bible School, all in person! Our theme "Kingdom Rock" brought more than 75 participants and again a dedicated group of volunteers. VBS is a fun four-evening event with a chance to explore Bible stories, crafts, music, and games.

Volunteers are the backbone of Faith Formation Ministries. We appreciate those adults and Confirmation students who have stepped up to this ministry opportunity. And we also thank our Education Ministry Team from 2021-2022: Sara Peters, Cienna Toso, Marnie Schuschke, and Laura Look. All of them have many years of service to Sharon's children's ministry.

Director of High School and Young Adult Ministries Annual Report

Greetings Sharon Lutheran,

As of July I have now been on staff here at Sharon for 3 years, and in that time it has been a pleasure and honor to serve and be trusted with the ministries for our High School and Young Adults.

This past year, I was very excited to welcome Pastor Tawanda on board, and he has been such a help and support for the work I do. My ministries have especially benefitted from his guidance.

This past year we renewed our focus on our Young Adult ministries in partnership with Calvary, United and Christus Rex. We have made some more attempts to set aside meeting times for our college age ministry that are more in line with their needs. We have had cookouts, camp fires, bowling and book studies. We have also strengthened our partnership with the other churches and the Grand Forks Pride community because of the number of people in this age group that are becoming more comfortable and open with who they are. We feel this is an important initiative to reach out to a community that has often been marginalized by the church, it also is modeling Jesus' command to love one another. God Talk on Tap continues at Half Brothers the first Thursday of every month. Numbers for this fluctuate based on the time of year, but we do draw a good mix of people from various age groups from 19-35.

In the High School space, we were happy to come back to in person instruction this past year. During the pandemic, numbers for things like 9th grade confirmation and youth group were dismal at best with maybe 2-3 people showing up on Zoom meetings each week. Back in person, our numbers got back to where we would have expected them all program year. 9th grade confirmation class was around 20-25 students each week, and our weekly High School youth group ReNew welcomed anywhere between 10-15 students. We had 32 11th grade students affirm their baptism last fall as well.

The challenge as always remains to retain our students once they feel their Confirmation programs are finished. I have tried to start inviting students who have turned 18 and aged out of my programs here to our young adult ministries. This has not been successful as of yet.

The loss of this church's young population to me remains one of the most pressing issues to the long term health of not just Sharon Lutheran but all church denominations. I think that we as a church need to look harder at the relationships or lack thereof that we are building with young people. Most students know Dave, Cheryl and myself, but it is becoming increasingly important that members of this congregation make an effort to volunteer in our faith formation programs, and make intentional time to try to get to know our students. Without any connection to the people of this congregation, our students see no reason to invest any time and energy here when they have endless options of social opportunities outside the church from sports, and school.

I also feel we are not addressing issues that are relevant to them. High School students are very much thinking about social justice issues around race, mental health, economic disparity, and acceptance of LGBTQIA+ individuals. This church needs to begin having honest, open, and more public discussion in those areas.

If a class of I Ith grade students is making their Confirmation in the fall, and this is the first time our congregation is seeing them or hearing their names, then we have failed to build any type of meaningful relationship with our students or their parents. Everyone in this church has gifts and talents to offer our young people, our responsibility to help them uphold their baptismal promises never ends.

Community Connections Team Annual Report

October 2021 – October 2022

The Community Connections Team's mission is to heighten congregational awareness of societal issues and provide an avenue for members to address these issues. The following is a list of congregational activities from this past year.

Backpack Program – Northland Rescue Mission and United Way are committed to ending hunger in our community. Locally over 2000 children each week receive a grocery bag filled with two breakfasts, two snacks, two lunches and two beverages. Children who don't have enough to eat are able to have food throughout the weekend because of this program. Sharon Lutheran volunteers help pack bags September through May.

Bags of Blessings – Throughout the year this program provides back packs with needed items like a t-shirt, sweatshirt, comb, shampoo and other personal care items. These bags of blessings are provided to residents at the Northlands Rescue Mission.

ELCA World Hunger — Gifts to ELCA World Hunger reach communities most in need throughout the world. Working through Lutheran churches and the Lutheran World Federation as well as other partners like Church World Service, Bread for the World, Lutheran World Relief and Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service more places are reached more effectively, than they could ever alone.

Feed My Starving Children –In this program volunteers from area churches spent the weekend packing, labeling, and boxing meals. Cargill scientifically develops these meals to provide nutritionally balanced meals for starving children. This non-denominational group works to raise money to purchase the unique supplies necessary for the meals for the at-risk children.

Love Feast – Each year Sharon members plan and serve a meal for the community at Zion United Methodist Church in March. This is a free meal intended for those who may not have the opportunity to receive a good meal. Area churches take turns each month serving the Love Feast which was a grab-and-go meal. This year 250 people were served.

Lutheran World Relief – Quilts are made and LWR's Care Kits are assembled to help people throughout the world dealing with some of life's most difficult situations –the aftermath of earthquakes and floods, fleeing home to escape violence and living in extreme poverty. Collections and assembly sessions were held resulting in 105 school kits.

Salvation Army Bell Ringing – Sharon members rang bells collecting donations for the Salvation Army.

Souper Bowl of Caring - was held the beginning of February.

Teddy Bear Ministry – Teddy Bears are collected to provide comfort to all those in need and are now displayed at the Welcome Center for anyone to take.

ELCA Good Gifts Global Barnyard –Christmas tree donation animal decorations were available for congregation members to purchase.

God's Work Our Hands – In September 20 people assembled 105 School Kits for Lutheran World Relief.

Noisy Offering donations went to North County Food Bank, Love Feast, Feed My Starving Children, Sunshine House, Ukraine Relief, Mission Picnic, St. Joes' Summer Lunch Program, Lutheran World Relief School Kits, and Sharon Faith Formation School supplies. Church Properties Team Annual Report

This report focuses on the time period of July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022 and includes a few things done since to provide additional information up to this reporting date.

Christmas decorating for the 2021 holidays was done as a congregational activity in conjunction with the Fellowship Team.

A contract has been signed for replacement of about 5,000 sf of roof at the SE section. Skinner Roofing will be doing the work. The completion of the work has been delayed due to their busy schedule. They are however holding their bid price.

Water leak at west skylight has been found and patched. Steamatic completed remediation and demo. Repair of interior finishes damaged has begun and will be finished when roof replacement work has been complete to make sure no more problems are seen.

Installation is complete for the new sound equipment in Celebration Hall which was paid for with a donation. Thank you to a professor of acoustics at UND for tuning the system.

The Building Task Force completed a tour of the existing building to review its condition and completed a questionnaire. As a reminder, the most recent addition/update is from 1997.

The Council reviewed and passed a clarification of the role of the Property Team. The need for long term planning related to building use and maintenance was emphasized. Constitutional issues were also cleared up on how much authority this group has regarding committing funds to repairs.

Thank you to Dan Kuzel, our custodian. He is dedicated to taking care of things and his work is invaluable. Remember to say thank you when you see him.

A few more things of note since July 2022:

Thank you to Deacon Jamie Travers for his work to construct a new donation center outside of South Hall this summer.

Conversations have been taking place with Electro Watchman to consider increasing building security with the installation of an electronic access system. There are still some decisions being made regarding the system details and the need to possibly replace some existing exterior

doors before getting a cost proposal. Due to the anticipated amount congregational support will be sought if this moves forward.

Three trees in bad shape have been removed by south the parking lot for \$3,600 by Boe's Tree Care.

Both the primary and secondary sewer ejection pumps in the lower level stopped working. Both have been replaced by Lunseth Plumbing and Heating and the system is working again as intended.

The Fall 2022 rummage sale was held on Friday August 26th and earned \$8,600 for future property needs. Thank you to Jodi Boettner and Naomi Bancroft for their leadership and everyone else who volunteered to make it a success.

We are currently reviewing options for snow removal for this winter.

There continues to be a need for Properties Team members to help as things come up. Thank you to everyone for their support over the last year.
